

Following a Robbery

Call 9-1-1 immediately. Do not hang up the phone until you are told to do so by the 9-1-1 telecommunicator.

Lock all doors and ask all witnesses to remain until the officer arrives.



Write down descriptions of the robbers and other pertinent information as soon as possible.

Protect the scene of the crime. Do not touch anything.

Preserve any items the robbers touched, and any note used.

Do not discuss details of the robbery with anyone until after speaking to the police officers.

Do not try to be a hero. Take no action that would jeopardize your own or someone else's safety.

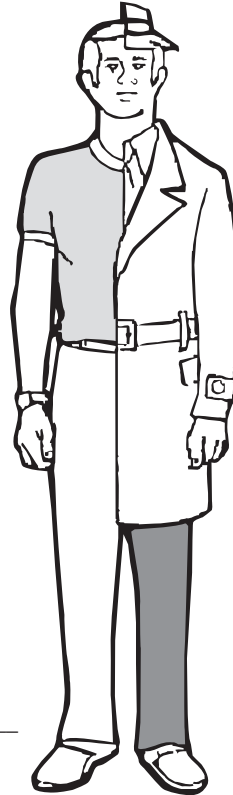

Armed Robbery:

Awareness and Prevention

Anyone who's ever been trapped in an armed robbery situation knows the threat of violence creates fear, tension, and panic which can easily result in tragedy. The display of force, the nervousness of the robber, and foolish acts of heroism by victims are all conditions which can trigger a regrettable incident.

While we cannot prescribe a potion or cure-all to rid your business of armed robbers, there are ways to discourage them and to minimize the chances of violence through sound business practices and proper employee training. This brochure outlines basic armed robbery deterrents which can be practiced as a minimum line of defense. Create Physical Deterrents

Ensure that visibility into your business from the outside is unobstructed by window signs and displays.

Secure any door not used by customers during business hours.

Use low display counters to keep lines of sight open throughout the store.

Set up a central cashier area from which all sections of the store can be viewed.

Install barriers to prevent unauthorized entrance into the teller and cashier areas.

Install telephones so that they can be answered without turning your back on the store and customers. Post 9-1-1 stickers beside each phone.

Consider installing surveillance cameras, convex mirrors, and warning signs as psychological deterrents.

Consider installing a special hold-up alarm system. The Arlington Police Department can help you determine the best system for your business.

Mark edges of the main doorway with colors or dots at varying heights to make it easier to estimate the height of a robber.

Have adequate lighting both inside and outside the store, especially at the front and rear entrances.

Keep all doors and windows secured when closed, using quality high security hardware.

Set up Procedural Deterrents

Set out security procedures in writing and instruct each employee in the procedures. Review regularly.

Do not open your business to a stranger who seeks admission before or after regular business hours.

Do not allow large amounts of cash to accumulate at your place of business, and post notices advertising the fact.

Vary times and routes to and from the bank when making deposits. Persons responsible for bank deposits should travel to and from the bank in the company of another person.

Check the references of all job applicants.

Train employees to alert other employees or the police when they observe suspicious behavior.

Close out cash registers and count cash in a private area; large sums of money present a tempting target.

Watch out for persons trying to hide on your premises at closing time. Check rest rooms and store-rooms before locking up.

Arrange work schedules so that at least two employees are present at opening and closing times.

Instruct employees of actions to be taken in the event of an armed robbery.



Know What to Do

Remain calm and be as alert and observant as possible if confronted with an armed robber. Be careful and cooperate.

Do not try to be a hero. Take no action that would jeopardize your own or someone else's safety.

Follow the robber's directions, but do not volunteer more than he asks for.

Do not make any sudden moves. If you must put your hands into your pockets for a key to the cash register, or take any action the robber might misinterpret, explain the action before doing it.

Place any notes that the robber may hand you out of sight, and retain as evidence.

Be attentive and make as many mental notes as possible which may help in identifying and tracking the robber.

Remember Details

Take a good look at the robbers. Look for special characteristics or mannerisms which will aid you in describing them.

Try to determine age, height, weight, and general appearance by comparing the robber to yourself or someone you know.

Note any peculiarities such as tattoos, scars, birthmarks, and prominent physical features.

Note type, style, and color of clothing.

Note type, size, and color of weapon.

Note any special jewelry such as class rings or objects with names or initials.

Try to get a good look at any vehicles used in get away, and if possible, write down the license number. Observe the direction in which the robbers leave, but do not jeopardize yourself trying to get this information.
